REFLECTION

Luke's Gospel narrates a number of episodes that evoke the Eucharist. The beautiful post resurrection evening meal at Emmaus is one such. Today's passage is another. Jesus welcomes the people, cures those in need of healing, speaks to them of the kingdom of God, and feeds them abundantly in the lonely place.

Paul's presentation of the institution of the Eucharist is the earliest written account we have. He wrote as a corrective to the selfish behaviour of the Corinthian community at their celebrations. They showed no regard for one another, no replication of Jesus' hospitality, no care for those in need, no focus of the kingdom of God. They were blind to the fact that Jesus shared the bread as a sign of his life given for his sisters and brothers.

Today's solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ challenges us to examine our lives. Does our participation in the Eucharist bear fruit in a self-giving in daily life? *God's Word 2019 Daily Reflections*

This Sunday, 23rd June, our final group of thirty-four children will receive their Sacrament of First Holy Communion at the 10am Mass.


We congratulate all the children and their families on reaching this special milestone in their faith journey, and we, as their faith community joyfully celebrate with them!



PRAYERS for our Parish:

As a caring community, we reach out in love and prayers to our brothers and sisters in **Armitree & Ashby Streets** praying for their needs and intentions.



When done right, Catholicism transforms us so deeply that we can't help but fall more in love with the Lord as we continue to 'seek' Him. This love cannot be contained and the natural effect of it is the outpouring and desire to share it with everyone. When I look at the young that I serve, I see my teenage self in them; Sometimes on a high with enthusiasm and hype, other times feeling completely lost and, from time to time being totally bored and disengaged. The beginnings of my personal faith journey stemmed from seeing my grandparents, parents, aunts and uncles serve the poor, the elderly and generally anyone who was struggling or in need of help. It was powerful and although I didn't know it at the time, I was watching the very love of God in action. I remember the thought of how inconvenient it was for my teenage self every Sunday after mass, when my parents would 'drag' us along to the local nursing home to sing for the residents or the many times my dad would stop the car to help other people fix theirs. I remember being grossed out whenever we stopped the car to pick up a homeless person walking on the street. My teenage self was preoccupied thinking about how bad they smelt and how embarrassing it was to sit there and eat with them. Yet these were beautiful seeds of love that were being planted firmly in my mind and heart of which I have never forgotten and now choose to replicate as much as possible. In a like manner I believe it's important to plant small seeds of God's love in our youth. Our focus for the next few weeks is to look at helping the homeless by putting together WINTER HAMPERS for them. People who live on the streets are accustomed to being abandoned, judged and condemned. They are often dejected and isolated because they are seen to have no value or worth. However, if we believe God created each person on earth in His Divine Image then how can we look at the homeless and not see Him present in them. We have to inspire people into a life of service for the homeless because it's all about connecting with the poor and the needy human to human, heart to heart, so that we transform stereotypes and tear down the walls of hatred and intolerance that separates us from loving our neighbour! Serving the poor helps us not to be self-centred, it gets us out of our heads and reminds us of all the things we must be grateful for. It reminds us of what really matters in life and what really does not! The homeless are not just cases to be managed- they are people- they are human beings! The best part of serving those who cannot pay us back is that it brings out the best in us! We don't all have to do everything, but we all have a part to play and so the youth are committed to bringing in over the next few youth meetings the following goods for our Winter Hampers for the Homeless: (Second hand) Towels/ Bras/ Underwear/ Socks; Blankets/ Sleeping Bags; Backpacks (New)Toothbrushes/Toothpaste/ Bars of Soap; Washing Powder.

Melchizedek brought bread and wine.

<u>Melchizedek</u> king of <u>Salem</u> brought bread and wine; he was a priest of God Most High. He pronounced this blessing: 'Blessed be <u>Abraham</u> by God Most High, creator of heaven and earth, and blessed be God Most High for handing over your enemies to you.' And <u>Abraham</u> gave him a tithe of everything.

Responsorial Psalm Ps 109:1-4. R. v.4

(*R.*) You are a priest for ever, in the line of <u>Melchizedek</u>. 1. The Lord's revelation to my Master: 'Sit on my right:

I will put your foes beneath your feet.' (R.)

2. The Lord will send from \underline{Zion} your sceptre of power: rule in the midst of all your foes. (*R.*)

3. A prince from the day of your birth on the holy mountains; from the womb before the daybreak I begot you. (*R.*)

4. The Lord has sworn an oath he will not change. 'You are a priest for ever, a priest like <u>Melchizedek</u> of old.' (*R.*)

Second Reading 1 Cor 11:23-26 A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

Every time you eat this bread and drink this cup, you are proclaiming the death of the Lord.

This is what I received from the Lord, and in turn passed on to you: that on the same night that he was betrayed, the Lord Jesus took some bread, and thanked God for it and broke it, and he said, 'This is my body, which is for you; do this as a memorial of me.' In the same way he took the cup after supper, and said, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Whenever you drink it, do this as a memorial of me.' Until the Lord comes, therefore, every time you eat this bread and drink this cup, you are proclaiming to his death.

Gospel Lk 9:11-17

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke They all ate and were filled.

Jesus made the crowds welcome and talked to them about the kingdom of God; and he cured those who were in need of healing. It was late afternoon when the Twelve came to him and said, 'Send the people away, and they can go to the villages and farms round about to find lodging and food; for we are in a lonely place here.' He replied, 'Give them something to eat yourselves.' But they said. 'We have no more than five loaves and two fish. unless we are to go ourselves and buy food for all these people.' For there were about five thousand men. But he said to his disciples, 'Get them to sit down in parties of about fifty.' They did so and had them all sit down. Then he took the five loaves and the two fish, raised his eyes to heaven, and said the blessing over them; then he broke them and handed them to his disciples to distribute among the crowd. They all ate as much as they wanted, and when the scraps remaining were collected the filled twelve baskets.
