REFLECTION

In the synagogue in Capernaum, Jesus encounters a man possessed by an unclean spirit. What was this unclean spirit? Of course, we can only speculate. Perhaps it was a spirit of injustice which meant that he was not paying his workers fairly. Perhaps it was the love of money. Perhaps it was the desire to be given the place of honour at the table, to be considered better than others and superior to them. When we hear references to someone possessed by an unclean spirit, we should not conjure up graphic images of demonic possession as portrayed in horror movies. The devil is too smart of that and will usually masquerade as something good, even virtuous, while hiding deeper motives. The man have been a respected member of the synagogue. Put simply, that man possessed by an unclean spirit could be you or me.

For a long time, this man could go comfortably to the synagogue and go home without feeling in any way disturbed about his life or actions. But when Jesus entered the synagogue and spoke with authority-the authority of God-the evil spirit in the man became deeply disturbed and threatened. Powerless against the Holy One of God, with a loud cry he came out of the man. It must have been a shocking but liberating experience for that poor man.

One of the greatest plays of the devil is to help us feel uncomfortable in our ways, to assure that we are very good, and everything is OK even when this is not the case. May the Lord visit us, as he visited the synagogue in Capernaum, and disturb anything within us that is not of God. May He drive out any forces of evil that may be finding a home within us, whether as individuals or as a Church community.

Dear parishioners,

We thank God that for 10 consecutive days, there were no cases of community transmission of Coronavirus. As such, from Friday, 29 January, easing of restrictions was announced.

But we have to continue to be careful and take all reasonable precautions to protect the health of everyone involved and to observe the directives we have received. We are again back with 230 people in the church including upstairs but still with 4 square metre rule. Indicators are in each pew for the limit of number of people to sit unless from same household. Dot markers are placed where people should sit. No booking required on all masses but on a first come, first serve basis.

It is always a requirement that attendees should register before entering the church. It is compulsory that registration now is through scanning the Service NSW QR code using smartphones with Service NSW App. For those with no smart mobile phones please write your name, telephone or email address in the sheet provided upon church entry at main door on weekends, side doors on Weekdays.

The <u>wearing of face masks</u> is still mandatory in closed-in places, including places of worship. THIS IS STILL COMPULSORY, \$200 fine imposed for not wearing.

Congregation singing is STILL cancelled until further notice. We are trying as much as possible to keep our church a safe place in which all are welcome to come and worship the Lord. I will be wearing mask during and after mass as required by the Archdiocese. I know you will understand that I do so for our common protection and compliance.

- Our Lady of Fatima Kingsgrove church is open for personal prayer from 8:30am to 12:00 noon Tuesday to Saturday. Physical distancing and hygiene directions apply. No booking required. Entry by side door.

Maximum of 230 people. Physical distancing and

- 3. Saturday 9:15 am morning Mass is followed by Confession until 10.30am. No booking required.
- Weekend Mass, regular schedule resumed, maximum of 230 people. All weekend mass - no Booking required

Please come early when attending mass for registration and to secure your seats. Until further notice, we are allowed 230 people inside the church including upstairs, on a first come, first, serve basis. Clune Centre will be open with speakers for attendees over 230.

5. In our 20 December bulletin, we had stated that Dispensation had been lifted but with the current easing of restrictions, no announcement yet from the Archbishop as of this writing. All Catholics but priests will be dispensed from Sunday and Holy day of obligations. Those unable to attend mass are encouraged to do Prayers at home, read scriptures or watch live streamed mass on TV and asking God for graces normally received at Holy Communion.

- Anointing of the sick will continue to be administered as a Viaticum for the gravely ill and the dying.
- 7. For **funerals** up to 300 people with 4-square metre
- 8. **Baptisms** can be celebrated with 230 attendees subject to 4-square-metre rule.
- 9. **Weddings -** can be celebrated with 230 guests inside our church. Other venues, 300 people.

All of these notices might change depending on the Covid 19 situation.

Please remember that you may offer Mass for anniversaries, special intentions, thanksgiving or any reason simply by placing your request in an envelope and bringing that to the office or in the mass offering box at the presbytery.

First Reading

Dt 18:15-20

A reading from the book of Deuteronomy

I will put my words into the prophet's mouth, and he will tell them all I command.

Moses said to the people: 'Your God will raise up for you a prophet like myself, from among yourselves, from your own brothers; to him you must listen. This is what you yourselves asked of the Lord your God at Horeb on the day of the Assembly. "Do not let me hear again" you said "the voice of the Lord my God, nor look any longer on this great fire, or I shall die"; and the Lord said to me, "All they have spoken is well said. I will raise up a prophet like yourself for them from their own brothers; I will put my words into his mouth and he shall tell them all I command him. The man who does not listen to my words that he speaks in my name, shall be held answerable to me for it. But the prophet who presumes to say in my name a thing I have not commanded him to say, or who speaks in the name of other gods, that prophet shall die."

An unmarried man can devote himself to the Lord's affairs, all he need worry about is pleasing the Lord; but a married man has to bother about the world's affairs and devote himself to pleasing his wife: he is torn two ways. In the same way an unmarried woman, like a young girl, can devote herself to the Lord's affairs; all she need worry about is being holy in body and spirit. The married woman, on the other hand, has to worry about the world's affairs and devote herself to pleasing her husband. I say this only to help you, not to put a halter round your necks, but simply to make sure that everything is as it should be, and that you give your undivided attention to the Lord.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

This is a new kind of teaching that speaks with authority.

Jesus and his followers went as far as Capernaum, and as soon as the Sabbath came Jesus went to the synagogue and began to teach. And his teaching made a deep impression on them because, unlike the scribes, he taught them with authority. In their synagogue just then there was a man possessed by an unclean spirit, and it shouted, 'What do you want with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are: the Holy One of God.' But Jesus said sharply, 'Be quiet! Come out of him!' And the unclean spirit threw the man into convulsions and with a loud cry went out of him. The people were so astonished that they started asking each other what it all meant. 'Here is a teaching that is new' they said 'and with authority behind it: he gives orders even to unclean spirits and they obey him.' And
