

#### REFLECTION

The scriptures offer a profound and multi-faceted revelation of God. In different situations, God is revealed as judge, as a savior, as servant, as creator, as father, as mother, as lover, etc. One of the most powerful and perhaps shocking images we find, especially in the book of Exodus, is of God as a warrior who frees the Israelites from slavery by slaying their enemies.

Clearly, God, the warrior is not one to ignore. The Isrealites would not have treated lightly the Lord's threat to kill them with the sword if they molested or oppressed the stranger in their midst or treated widows and orphans harshly.

This warrior God is praised in today's responsorial psalm. The Scriptiures put this psalm on the lips of David after the Lord had rescued him from the clutches of his enemies. Using military images, David praises the Lord for being his fortress, his shield, his stronghold and his mighty strength against his foes.

The image of God as a warrior can be very disturbing. We need to see that what motivates the Lord to be a warrior is a deep love for those who are oppressed. We can think of the fierce love of parents who will do anything to protect their vulnerable children.

We cannot love this God without also loving God's people. Not to love our neighbour is to put ourselves at enmity with God. Today's first reading urges us not to adopt a narrow definition of neighbour. The stranger in out midst will always be the object of the special love of our warrior God.

### Sacramental Corner: All Saints and All Souls Feast Day

It is a joyous time to celebrate the two consecutive Feast days at the beginning of November, as they bring the living and the dead together at the conclusion of our Church Calendar.

In the very beginning of the Early Church, people who were called to be Baptised completed this Sacrament on their deathbeds. This was to ensure that their entire life's sins were forgiven. Later as the people of the Early Church kept records of the faithful departed, they were known as the *elect* – those who are *called* by God. The term '*elect*' is now commonly used for all who are called by God. Namely those who are undertaking Baptism, the enlistment of person becoming a Saint or holding an office in the Catholic Church.

Do you ever wonder why All Saints and All Souls Day are so close to each other? The answer comes from the notion that we are all marked by the Holy Spirit from our Baptism. We are marked with God's seal so that when we are alive, we live for our Lord. Then, when we die, our Soul has that marking to show that we belong to Christ.

Saints start their earthly life, the same as many of us. They all had upbringings that relate to their environments. What sets them apart is the fulfilment of their calling to God. As we are all called to live a Holy life united to God, we see that the Saints united their entire life – the good, the bad, the sorrowful, the hard, the joyful, the confusion, their study, the disbelief and more – to God. Their death would be like all of us. The journey of their Soul would also be the same. BUT the heavenly



connection to God will be different. The saints are lucky to stand at the forefronts of Heaven and have direct contact with God. We know this as we are constantly asking them to 'pray for us'. It is invigorating to know we have this notable *elect* praying to God with us for our Earthly causes. Hence why we should acknowledge every single Saint that is known or unknown to us on the 1<sup>st</sup> November.

What about the Holy Souls? We all know a person that 'was taken away so early' or 'was such a saint'. Their legacy will never be forgotten, and the Catholic Church ensures all Souls are prayed for on the 2<sup>nd</sup> November. As you remember them, it is ideal to thank God for having them in this life and that we had the ability to know or hold them. Their Baptism of Water or by Blood (meaning the intention of their life was to Baptise them before their death) means they have the seal of the Holy Spirit and they too, would have the ability to stand at the front line of Heaven after their purification in purgatory.

Our earthly job is to find our way to become closer to God and to take the cross we are given and allow it to become the pavement to Heaven. Let us always pray that God will comfort, and hold close all members of His Church. May the Holy Souls who have departed from our Parish rest in peace.

We will remember them.



#### OUR YOUTH.....

During our September youth group gathering, Father Casey blessed the meal before we commenced. The gathering centered around the theme of

"The Cross" with Tuione and Joe leading the discussion. They explored the various ways Catholics perceive the cross, whether as a religious symbol representing Jesus' sacrifice or simply as a piece of jewellery.

# **OUR YOUTH.....**

Throughout the session, we encouraged the youth to look up specific Bible verses, helping them develop their skills in using and reading the Bible for future gatherings. One of the key verses discussed was Romans 5:8, which states, "But God demonstrates his own love for us in this, while we were still sinners Christ died for us." We also delved into the story of the Bronze Snake (Numbers 21:4-9), which serves as a powerful metaphor for God's grace, forgiveness, and the role of faith in bringing healing and salvation.

During the gathering, the youth engaged in open discussions about their perspectives on the cross and their emotional responses when looking at it. Some expressed feelings of gratitude, as the cross symbolised Jesus' sacrifice for sinners like themselves. Others associated it with the Catholic Church and the concept of forgiveness through confession. Following these discussions, which expanded the youth's understanding of the Cross, we concluded the gathering with team-building activities.

The youth were divided into two groups, and we organised four rounds of different activities. These included a crossword puzzle, a word search, trivia questions related to the crucifixion, and a spelling bee. Congratulations to Group 2 who were our all-rounder champions. To end our gathering, Father Casey offered a final blessing to the youth group.

# First Reading

Exodus 22:20-26

A reading from the book of Exodus

If you are harsh with the widow or the orphan, my anger will rage against you.

The Lord said to Moses, 'Tell the sons of Israel this, "You must not molest the stranger or oppress him, for you lived as strangers in the land of Egypt. You must not be harsh with the widow, or with the orphan; if you are harsh with them, they will surely cry out to me, and be sure I shall hear their cry; my anger will flare and I shall kill you with the sword, your own wives will be widows, your own children orphans.

"If you lend money to any of my people, to any poor man among you, you must not play the usurer with him: you must not demand interest from him.

"If you take another's cloak as a pledge, you must give it back to him before sunset. It is all the covering he has; it is the cloak he wraps his body in; what else would he sleep in? If he cries to me. I will listen, for I am full of pity."

# **Second Reading**

1 Thessalonians 1:5-10

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Thessalonians

You observed the sort of life we lived when we were with you, which was for your instruction, and you were led to become imitators of us, and of the Lord; and it was with the joy of the Holy Spirit that you took to the gospel, in spite of the great opposition all round you. This has made you the great example to all believers in Macedonia and Achaia since it was from you that the word of the Lord started to spread – and not only throughout Macedonia and Achaia, for the news of your faith in God has spread everywhere. We do not need to tell other people about it: other people tell us how we started the work among you, how you broke with idolatry when you were converted to God and became servants of the real, living God; and how you are now waiting for Jesus, his Son, whom he raised from the dead, to come from heaven to save us from the retribution which is coming.

Matthew 22:34-40

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

You shall love the Lord your God and your neighbour as yourself.

When the Pharisees heard that Jesus had silenced the Sadducees they got together and, to disconcert him, one of them put a question, 'Master, which is the greatest commandment of the law?' Jesus said, 'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment. The second resembles it: you must love your neighbour as yourself. On these two commandments hang the whole Law, and the Prophets also.'
